

Remarks by Montara Vilayvanh President, Students Against Prejudice Wichita High School East Americans All® Press Conference, November 6, 2003 Wichita, Kansas

Good morning,

I am Montara Vilayvanh, president of Students Against Prejudice at East High. I'd like to welcome you to East High, and thank you for coming to celebrate the potential relocation of the Americans All[®] headquarters here to Wichita.

I would also like to thank you for your support of what this organization stands for. Just your presence here alone documents your support of the fight against bias, discrimination and prejudice, all of which can be overcome through education.

Diversity is one of the greatest qualities in life, because after all, variety is the spice of life. However, we know that people still fear what is different from them. And at the end of the day, we still run back to our North Barrio, our College Hill, our Northeast Side, our East Borough, our Plainview or wherever else we live. continue to improve on that situation. And the front pages would contain less about terrorism or the state of the economy. Rather they would be covered with the positive vibrations of the uniting of people. This world has no more room for hate and intolerance.
